As a parent, you want your child to grow up to be a self-reliant, dependable and caring individual. Scouting has these same goals in mind for them. - Scouting teaches family values and works to strengthen your relationship with your child. Scouting activities can provide added value to the time you have with your child. It also provides activities for the whole family to enjoy.



CUBS SCOUTS: DO YOUR BEST. HAVE FUN DOING IT.



The best way to find out what you do best is to do it. Swing a bat. Pitch a tent. Build a Pinewood Derby car. Cub Scouts are at that magical age where everything is new and fun. They live in a world of "firsts" — first home run, first campfire, first checkered flag — where their game plan is their imagination. Their most valuable reward are the friends they make for life and a parent's proud smile. These are the invaluable experiences that can be had in Scouting.

Did you know that the 5 C's of positive youth development are woven throughout the Scouting program?

YOUR CHILD IS A MEMBER OF A DEN

Cub Scouts is a family centered program for youth and adults.

- A Den is six to ten youth who meet with adult leaders to play games, learn skills, complete adventures, perform skits and songs, and take field trips. Dens are divided by grade level.
- Dens meet at the convenience of leaders and families, at least twice a month, perhaps weekly.
- A Den is led by a Den Leader (parent volunteer) who is assisted by an assistant Den Leader and parent helpers who share the fun.

YOUR CHILD AND THE DEN ARE MEMBERS OF A PACK

- Each Pack is made up of one or more Dens.
- Once a month, all Cub Scout families attend a Pack meeting with games, skits, songs, ceremonies and presentations of badges that Scouts earned that month.
- The Pack meeting is led by the Cubmaster with help from other parents.
- The Pack families will also have other activities, like Pack Family Camping, Pinewood Derbies, and field trips.



- Chartered Organizations include schools, parent-school organizations, religious organizations, service clubs, and other organizations interested in youth.
- Your Chartered Organization approves leadership, helps secure
 a meeting place and keeps the Pack within both their guidelines
 and policies and those of Scouting America.
- Your Chartered Organization selects a representative as a liaison between the Pack and the Chartered Organization.

A PROMISE TO PARENTS

Parents will say that Scouting in Grand Canyon Council, Scouting Arizona offered their family fun and adventurous things to do. Through the structured and safe environments, Scouting helped their son or daughter develop leadership skills and values important to good citizenship and service to others.



On the advancement trail, a Cub Scout progresses towards a badge of rank based on their grade. They need not have earned the previous rank in order to earn the next. To earn each badge of rank a Cub Scout earns the six required Adventures and at least two elective Adventures. Required Adventures are based on the aims and areas of importance in Scouting. Each badge of rank is age-appropriate, so earning a rank below a Cub Scout's current grade is not permitted.

Cub Scouts offers boys and girls a dynamic and enriching experience, fostering personal growth through various exciting adventures. Scouting not only encourages a love for the outdoors, but also creates lasting friendships, making Cub Scouts an excellent platform for youth to explore, learn, and thrive!





LION (KINDERGARTEN) AND TIGER (FIRST GRADE) DENS

Kindergarten and first grade Cub Scouts join with an adult partner, usually the parent or guardian. At den meetings, Lions and Tigers work on Adventures that are found in their handbooks and the Adult Partner Guides.







WOLF (2ND GRADE), BEAR (3RD GRADE), AND WEBELOS (4TH GRADE) DENS

Children at this age are becoming more independent, and activities are designed to meet their developmental needs. Cub Scouts work on Adventures that are found in their handbooks.

ARROW OF LIGHT (5TH GRADE) DEN

The Arrow of Light den is focused on preparing to join Scouts BSA. Arrow of Light Scouts move to the next level of Scouting, Scouts BSA.

SCOUTS BSA

When a Cub Scout reaches 11 years of age, and completed the fifth grade, they graduate from Cub Scouts to Scouts BSA at an impressive graduation ceremony. We aim to graduate every Cub Scout into Scouts BSA. Generally, your child will be prepared to join a troop in February or March of their fifth-grade year in time to plan for their first Scout summer camp experience. Separate Scout troops are organized for boys and girls.

Funding Scouting is a shared responsibility between the family, the Pack, and the Council. It takes more than \$6 million per year to ensure that the programs, properties, and personnel are in place to make Scouting the premier choice for families in Arizona.

The Family — members buy their own uniforms, handbooks, personal equipment and typically pay their own camp fees. Pack dues help defray packs expenses. Participation in Pack fundraisers can reduce out-of-pocket expenses.

The Pack — creates a budget to costs necessary to deliver a quality program. Income sources include money-earning projects and family dues.

The Council — financial support for the Council comes from a variety of sources including annual donor campaigns, grants, fees, product sales, and special events.

The Scout — A Scout is Thrifty and earns their own way.

The council hosts two fundraisers for Packs to help reduce costs for families.

POPCORN SALE

Scouts can earn great prizes, and be invited to special events, and earn camp scholarships by selling gourmet popcorn products exclusively for Scouting. The sale runs from September to November.

CAMP CARDS

Scouts sell discount cards with coupons for local businesses. Commissions earned on the sale helps Packs reduce costs to the family including camp fees. Every Scout deserves to benefit from a summer camp experience; the Adventure card Sale makes that possible. The sale runs from February to April.



SCOUTING MOBILE APP

and track advancement, track logs like service hours, hiking, and camping, view parent/child profiles, submit feedback, and view the pack calendar and other information. If you want to get a head start, go to scoutbook.scouting.org to create a login.

BLUE AND GOLD BANQUET

The blue and gold banquet is a birthday party for Scouting and Packs hold an annual family celebration. Typically, Scouts receive their rank advancements at this event.

CUB FUN DAYS & OVERNIGHTS

Enjoy exciting annual themed events like R-Boo-C, a Halloween weekend camp at R-C Scout Ranch for Cub Scouts, families, and Scouts BSA volunteers. Families can also join a themed weekend at Camp Kaibab, with a new fun theme each year located at Camp Raymond. Plus, Cub Country and other fun days are held throughout the council for more great Cub Scout experiences.

FIELD TRIPS AND SPECIAL OUTINGS

These are great ways to learn more about the people and places in your community.

PINEWOOD DERBY

The Pinewood Derby is an annual parent-scout project where you can design and build a race car from a block of wood. Cub Scouts learn the valuable lesson of sportsmanship by racing their cars on a gravity track against their fellow Scouts.

DAY OF SERVICE

A Scout is helpful. The Day of Service is a one-day, council-wide effort to conduct service projects to benefit our communities. Packs may participate in food drives, conservation projects, or other community activities. Projects are chosen by the Pack.



Scouting operates through volunteer leadership. Volunteer leaders are an example of Scouting's principle of service to others. Naturally, parents are the primary source of leaders in the Scouting program. You volunteer not only to fill a role in Scouting, but also to help your child and their friends, and to have the chance to be a positive influence on the youth in your community.

CUB SCOUT LEARNING LIBRARY

Whether you are a parent helper, a committee chair, Cubmaster or Den Leader, the Learning Library at **CubScouts.org** is the chief location online for finding everything you need to get the most out of Scouting. This site is packed with helpful and important information designed to make your experience great!

The Pack is led by parent volunteers who provide leadership to a variety of key positions that ensure every youth and family has a quality Scouting experience. It is for this reason we encourage at least one parent to participate in a leadership role.

DEN LEADER(S)

Leads the den at den and monthly Pack meetings. Participates in Pack leaders' meetings.

CUBMASTER

Helps plan and carry out the Pack program, with the help of others. Emcees the monthly pack meeting and attend the Pack leaders' meetings.

PACK COMMITTEE

Pack committee members (some positions listed below) perform administrative functions of the pack.

COMMITTEE CHAIR

Presides at all pack committee meetings. Helps recruit adult leaders and attends the monthly pack meeting and pack committee meeting.

SECRETARY/TREASURER

Keeps all records for the pack, including bank account, financial records, etc. Attends pack meetings and pack committee meetings. May publish a monthly bulletin, newsletter or even a website.

ADVANCEMENT CHAIR

Maintains advancement records using the Scoutbook app. Orders and obtains all badges and insignia. Attends the monthly pack meeting and pack committee meeting.

PACK TRAINER

Guides leaders and parents to training resources and classes (online and in person).

PARENT HELPERS/COMMITTEE MEMBERS

Short-term roles coordinating pack participation in sales events, Day of Service, Pinewood Derby, Blue and Gold Banquet, day camp, etc. There is a task for every family. Don't sit on the sideline cheering, get in the game and enjoy Scouting with your child.

PARENT TALENT SURVEY

All parents are asked to complete a short survey that will help the Pack leadership identify resources available to help deliver a stronger, more exciting program for the youth.

TRAINING EVERY SCOUT DESERVES A TRAINED LEADER

Being a volunteer in your child's Cub Scout Pack is an exciting journey where you and your family will share many lifelong memories. The first step in that journey is to complete training. Training provides you with the tools and resources you will need to lead a quality program for Scouts.

STEP 1 – SAFEGUARDING YOUTH TRAINING

All registered adult leaders must complete Safeguarding Youth Training. Scouting America places the greatest importance on creating the most secure environment possible for our youth members. Safeguarding Youth Training covers Scouting's barriers to abuse, types of abuse, how to respond to abuse, and proper reporting procedures. In order for an adult to remain a registered leader in Scouting America, Safeguarding Training is required every year.

 Create a login to my.scouting.org and select the safeguarding training link.

STEP 2 - POSITION SPECIFIC TRAINING

Job Specific Training is designed to present in-depth information for a new leader in a specific leadership position such as Den Leader, Cubmaster, etc. All leaders must also complete Hazardous Weather Training to understand program requirements to deliver a safe outdoor environment.

- Login to your my.scouting.org account and go to the Learning Center and select your appropriate position training. For example, Tiger Den Leader, Cubmaster, Committee Members, etc.
- If you change positions during your tenure, you will need to take the training for your new position.

STEP 3 - BASIC ADULT LEADER OUTDOOR ORIENTATION

After completing your required position training, you may opt to complete the following:

 In order for a Pack to go camping, at least one adulty must take Basic Adult Leader outdoor Orientation (BALOO). Visit the council support center for a calendar of available training dates.

Thank you for taking the time to make Scouting in your Pack the strongest it can be. Every youth deserves a trained leader.

Being a volunteer leader is fun and rewarding. But you don't have to do it all by yourself. Between your Pack and Council there are many individuals and resources available to give you and your child the best Scouting experience possible.
